

ADVANTAGE COAST COMMUNITY LED LOCAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME









The Advantage Coast programme is funded by the European Structural and Investment Funds and has a total package of £12m – with £8m (including £6.9m ESIF grant funding) from the public sector and £4m from the private sector.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council (ERYC) is the Accountable Body, responsible for overseeing the administration and management of the CLLD programme.

cLLD is a locally managed funding programme that targets selected areas in Bridlington and Scarborough to encourage local organisations and groups to suggest, design and deliver projects that contribute to increased employment, develop businesses and improve opportunities to enhance local economies and communities. To deliver CLLD a Local Action Group (LAG) needed to be established comprised of representatives from local public, private and civil society organisations. In conjunction with the Accountable Body, the LAG acts as the applicant for the implementation stage of the programme and is accountable for its financial performance and compliant delivery.

Prior to confirmation of funding ERYC undertook some at risk work, establishing a shadow LAG to ensure continued local community input and capacity building, as well as a healthy project pipeline. The shadow LAG assisted in the development of a Local Development Strategy (LDS),

which includes an overarching vision for the programme to 'engage, inspire and innovate'. The programme aims to support residents and businesses living and operating within the area's 20% most disadvantaged communities.

Since starting in 2018, 53 projects have been funded to deliver CLLD activities, with a total of £12.4m invested. Providers are drawn from the pubic, private and voluntary/community sectors, providing highly localised support

The overall objective of the CLLD programme is 'to significantly improve the opportunities for people in the CLLD area to contribute to and benefit from sustainable social inclusion and economic growth.' This is supported by four specific objectives:

Borough of

- Increase local engagement activity in target areas
- Identify barriers experienced by target beneficiaries which prevent or limit contribution to economic activity
- Improve the capacity for individuals and businesses to create and access economic opportunities in the CLLD area
- Sustain and strengthen social inclusion and economic performance in the CLLD area

Employment support projects, funded by the European Social Fund, have signed up 2238 participants, helping 659 into employment and a further 444 into education or training.

Business support projects, funded from the European Regional Development pot, have assisted 225 entrepreneurs and 1105 businesses, as well as helping businesses to create 229 new jobs.


BRISTOL ACCORD

The Social Value Engine uses the Bristol Accord to enable you to see how your activity is building a more attractive place - where people want to live and work, both now and in the future.

The Bristol Accord was developed in 2005 when the UK Government worked with all the EU Member States to agree what makes communities sustainable and to foster 'place making' skills.

A sustainable community should be safe, fair, thriving, environmentally sensitive, well run, served, well connected and well designed and built.

This common framework for defining a successful sustainable community is shown in the diagram above.

METHODOLOGY

SOCIAL RETURN ON INVESTMENT (SROI)

As part of a full evaluation of the CLLD programme we are undertaking an analysis of its Social Return on Investment (SROI). Social Return on Investment is acknowledged in HM Treasury Green Book as an effective means of assessing impact. The SROI process involves identifying a financial proxy for an outcome, which enables a value to be ascribed to the impact it has delivered. SROI methods calculate a figure for the value created per £1 spent.

To calculate the social return of the programme as a whole we have assessed every project for each year of its duration; as well as assessing the social return of the programme's activities, processes and structures over and above the collective value of its projects.

THE SOCIAL VALUE ENGINE (SVE)

We are using the Social Value Engine to calculate SROI. This tool was developed jointly by East Riding of Yorkshire Council and Rose Regeneration, and it is accredited by Social Value UK. The Social Value Engine contains over 200 financial proxies, which can be used to quantify the value of an outcome. Each outcome is referenced against one of the eight domains in the Bristol Accord - a means of assessing the relative sustainability of a place. This means that when the social value of an intervention is calculated it can be described not just in terms of a financial value but also in terms of its impact on the relative sustainability of the community in which it is located.
